PREPARING FOR THE UPCOMING SACS EVALUATION

In keeping with the mission of Our Lady of Mercy School, it is important that the school retain its accreditation as a recognized institution of learning, not only in Brazil but also in the United States. Accreditation is conferred by the State of Rio de Janeiro's Ministry of Education and Culture (MEC) for Brazil, and by the **Southern Association of Colleges and Schools (SACS)** for the United States.

Regular visits by authorities and evaluation teams are responsible for deciding if Our Lady of Mercy School offers programs in accordance with national and international norms, and therefore, should be accredited.

Our Lady of Mercy School takes pride in having achieved these goals on an ongoing basis. The next major evaluation scheduled by SACS will occur during the last week in April when three committee members will spend one week in school, walking through our classrooms, reviewing our programs, and examining our documentation in every area.

The OLM Teaching staff will hear the final report that will be presented in the afternoon of the last day of evaluation. We are working to practice showing "OLM's BEST" as of Right Now!

HISTÓRIA E FILOSOFIA DO JUDÔ

O judô teve sua origem com o professor Jigoro Kano, um jovem de físico franzino, graduado em filosofia pela Universidade Imperial de Tóquio. Conhecia Jiu-Jitsu e procurava sistematizar as técnicas e fundamentar sua prática em princípios filosóficos bem definidos, a fim de torná-la um meio eficaz para aprimoramento físico, do intelecto e do caráter, num processo de aperfeiçoamento do ser humano.

Em 1882, Jigoro fundou sua própria escola e, para distingui-la de maneira evidente das formas que se identificava o jiu-jitsu, denominou-a de JUDÔ KODOKAN. Essa modalidade destina-se à formação e à preparação integral do homem através das atividades físicas de luta corporal e de aperfeiçoamento

moral. Esse aperfeiçoamento sustentava-se através de princípios filosóficos e de exaltação do caráter, que eram a essência do espírito marcial dos samurais.

No início tive algumas dificuldades; uma delas era a insegurança. Levei dois meses para pisar no tatame. Tinha medo de interagir e de me machucar com as quedas. Um dia o meu professor, cansado de tanto investimento para me

convencer a participar das aulas, me levantou do chão, me segurou pela gola do quimono e me colocou de frente a outra criança para que assim eu pudesse lutar. Chorando e com um pouco de raiva, fiz uma queda que tinha aprendido só em observar os meus colegas. Foi um quedaço!

A partir desse momento, eu me apaixonei por essa arte e me prometi que seria um faixa preta e professor de judô.





As artes marciais são sistemas de práticas para treinamento de combate, geralmente, sem o uso de armas de fogo ou outros dispositivos modernos.

A origem do termo artes marciais é ocidental e latina, uma referência às artes de guerra e de luta. Sua origem é vinculada a Marte - deus da guerra greco-romano. Assim, as artes marciais, segundo esta mitologia, são as artes ensinadas pelo deus Marte aos homens.

Sua origem confunde-se com o desenvolvimento da civilização. Com o avanço da onda tecnológica agrícola e com o acúmulo de riquezas e de poder, que despertam a cobiça e a inveja, surge também a agressão. Com isso, abre-se espaço para a profissionalização da proteção pessoal. Hoje, as artes marciais, além de praticadas como treinamento militar, policial e de autodefesa, também são praticadas como esporte.

Atualmente, pessoas de todo o mundo estudam as artes marciais por diferentes motivos: condicionamento físico, defesa pessoal, coordenação físico-motora, lazer, disciplina, interação em um grupo social, e formação de uma personalidade sadia. A prática das artes marciais possibilita extravasar a tensão, harmonizar o indivíduo e, posicionar o ser humano de forma positiva na vida.

Muitas mulheres não praticavam artes marciais por acharem violentas ou exclusivamente masculinas. Mas os tempos mudaram e as mulheres também! Mais decididas, independentes, seguras e fortes elas estão marcando presença nos dojos e academias.

O número de mulheres que procura este tipo de esporte aumenta a cada dia. Um dos principais motivos é testar seus próprios limites e saber como lidar com eles. Quanto mais conhecemos

nossos limites, mais segurança temos. Isto deve ser testado periodicamente, já que mudamos todos os dias. Os esportes em geral proporcionam esse auto-conhecimento, mas nem todos são tão completos quanto as artes marciais.

Eu sempre gostei de artes marciais e meu pai sempre me incentivou. Eu já havia praticado Luta-Livre e Krav Magá, defesa pessoal do exército Israelense.

Em outubro de 2009 eu tive meu primeiro contato com o MMA (Mixed Martial Arts). Entrei no centro de treinamento da RFT (Renovação Fight Team) para conhecer e não saí mais.

A Renovação Fight Team tem como líder o Mestre Cromado, 2º Dan em Luta-Livre Esportiva. Cromado tem em seu currículo mais de 35 campeonatos de Luta Livre, em que foi campeão absoluto em todos eles. No MMA, foi o número 1 no ranking do Shooto Japão na categoria até 70Kg.

MMA é definido como uma modalidade de luta em que os praticantes não precisam seguir um estilo específico de arte marcial. O praticante utiliza golpes ou técnicas das mais diferentes artes marciais como o boxe, Luta-Livre, Muay Thai, entre outras.

Com a prática do MMA eu aprendo a administrar minha própria força, desenvolvo os reflexos e a coordenação motora, treino foco, equilíbrio e explosão. Essa prática tem um sentido filosófico, principalmente se comparada as situações da vida - saber cair e se levantar. Além de tudo isso o MMA favorece muito à saúde, à beleza corporal, à firmeza de toda a musculatura e à postura. Socos e chutes são trabalhados durante a aula aperfeiçoando a coordenação, o ritmo, a resistência muscular, a flexibilidade e o condicionamento cardiorrespiratório, além de aliviar a tensão. Os benefícios são numerosos! Recomendo a todos que buscam uma melhor qualidade de vida. É uma das melhores formas de encontrar o equilíbrio necessário para enfrentar os desafios que a vida moderna oferece. Eu estou muito feliz em fazer parte da RFT; a equipe é maravilhosa, os atletas são guerreiros, não só no ringue como na vida. Tudo o que eu aprendo lá dentro, eu aplico no meu dia a dia. Em suma, RFT para mim é uma filosofia de vida.



THE RELENTLESS GRITNESS OF LENT

"Lent is a privileged time for recovering the sight and the commitment that let us see and enter the passion play going on around us."

Lent is a season of soul-searching and repentance. It is a season for reflection and taking stock. The Catholic Church encourages her faithful to look at Lent as a spiritual journey that prepares the soul and strengthens the faith in Christ to be renewed at the celebration of Easter, his life and Resurrection, the center of the Christian Faith. By observing the forty days of Lent, the individual Christian imitates Jesus' withdrawal into the wilderness for forty days. As Jesus overcame temptation, so can each Christian do the same in his every day life?

Because Sunday is the day of the Resurrection, we skip over Sundays when we calculate the length of Lent. Therefore, in the Western Church, Lent always begins on Ash Wednesday, the seventh Wednesday before Easter.

The Catholic Church in Brazil has taken this season as an opportunity to reflect on the new life that comes with Easter to launch the "*Campanha da Fraternidade*" as a way to exercise fraternity and solidarity. The Church wishes that each Catholic be like Jesus and fight against all values that contradict the kingdom of God on earth: Injustice, Hopelessness, Greed, and Violence. This year's campaign is ecumenical because the Catholic and the Protestant Churches are together. They will encourage all to be attentive to our approach to money. Jesus warned us not to serve money. In the Gospel according to Matthew we read: "*No one can serve two masters. He will either hate one and love the other, or be devoted to one and despise the other. You cannot serve God and money*". (6:24). Doesn't it apply to today's world and its appealing to consumerism?

The new entrance welcomes members and visitors alike with a wide, modern looking outdoor foyer, a plant and a large bullet-proof window. Inside there is a computer savvy receptionist/doorman or two, leading people through turnstiles, like those in mass transport, that are activated by biometric (fingerprint) identification. Staff and students (6th through 12th) were registered in the IT Department.

During school hours parents are registered with photo and thumbprint as they enter the school grounds the first time. Afterwards, they enter and exit from the Main Entrance. All on-time pre-school and elementary students enter through the small blue door at the far end of the wall. Students from the preschool and elementary who arrive late to school enter through the large blue sliding door next to the main entrance. OLM wants to ensure a safe environment for its school community.

PHOTOSYNTHESIS




For sure, you have heard of the process of **photosynthesis**, but maybe you do not know what it means exactly. Photosynthesis is a process where autotrophic living things (that can produce their own energy from inorganic compounds) absorb the sunlight and change it to chemical energy – sugar – storing it as starch. This energy is vital for the survival of these living things, which include plants, algae, and many other species. Photosynthesis can only occur with the use of H_2O , the use of carbon dioxide from the air and, of course, the sunlight. This process occurs in the chlorophyll, which is the green pigment in the leaf responsible for doing photosynthesis.

How is photosynthesis important for us human beings? Plants are autotrophic living things while we are heterotrophic, meaning that we cannot produce our own energy from inorganic compounds. Therefore, we need to eat autotrophic living things or other heterotrophic living things (example: animals), so that we can get the correct amount of organic compounds needed by our body. Also, autotrophs release oxygen after they do photosynthesis, the oxygen we will inhale.

Chlorophyll is not the only pigment existent in a leaf. Areas with definite seasons receive less sunlight in different periods of the year , and therefore different pigments act to absorb this less intense sunlight These pigments have different colors and that is why leaves in the Northern Hemisphere are brownish in the autumn.

In our Biology class, we went to the lab to observe and detect the presence of different colorful pigments in a plant leaf.

We used a technique of chromatograph. We tested different colorful leaves and we separated the different pigments by weight (the pigments are represented by the colorful lines in the filter paper in the picture) and were able to realize that all plants contain green pigments despite their beautiful and bright colors.

DEOXYRIBONUCLEIC ACID

DNA, or Deoxyribonucleic acid, is a macromolecule present in all living organisms that carries genetic material. Its main role is the long-term storage of information, and its transmission. In Eukaryotic cells, the DNA is stored inside the cell's nucleus, while in Prokaryotic cells it is stored in an area of the cytoplasm. The DNA sequences that carry this genetic information are called genes. DNA is also extremely important during the synthesis of proteins. Within cells, it is organized into long structures called chromosomes. Humans have 46 chromosomes.

Chemically, DNA consists of a double-helix structure, meaning it has two bonding strands of simple units called nucleotides, with backbones made of sugars and phosphate groups joined by hydrogen bonds. These two strands run in opposite directions to each other. Attached to each sugar is one of four types of molecules

called nitrogenous bases. The four bases are, Thymine (T), Adenine (A), Cytosine (C) and Guanine (G). It is the sequence of these four bases along the backbone that encodes genetic information.

This information is read using the genetic code, which specifies the sequence of the amino acids within proteins. Each amino acid is formed by a combination of three nitrogenous bases. The code is read by copying stretches of DNA into the related nucleic acid RNA (Ribonucleic acid), in a process called transcription.


So that the DNA could be better observed, the 11th grade students performed the extraction of the DNA of the strawberry in our Biology class. For this experiment, many materials were required, including strawberries, detergent, alcohol, and salt, among others. After carefully following all the steps provided, we were able to extract the DNA of the strawberry cells. It was observed that the DNA looked like a spider web-like structure and a thin chain of white minuscule balls that were linked to each other. It was extremely soft and delicate.

The DNA was visible because the salt and detergent used throughout the experiment were able to break the cell wall and the cell membrane, and also the alcohol separated the DNA from the plant cell, making it float on the water. The DNA is originally invisible to the naked eye; it could only be seen because there were thousands of them that were removed from many different strawberry cells.

GLUCOSE: OUR SOURCE OF ENERGY

Glucose is the main type of carbohydrate used by our cells. They use it as a raw material in a process that produces energy and is called cellular respiration. Even though it is essential for us, the level of glucose in our blood has to be balanced. One of the functions of the pancreas is to keep this in equilibrium. But what happens when our pancreas does not work?

Diabetes is a disease that is caused when there is a higher level of glucose in our blood. There are two types of diabetes, one of them is when the pancreas cannot produce insulin, a hormone that decreases the amount of glucose in our body, allowing there to be a high amount of it in the blood. This type of diabetes is found mostly on children, teenagers, and that for the rest of their lives, they will have to take insulin. The other type of diabetes is when the pancreas is able to create insulin, but the organism is unable to remove it. This diabetes is found mostly on adults, who are overweighed or do not perform and exercise. Therefore, to prevent diabetes, you have to maintain a balanced meal with less sugar and exercise. Diabetes kills, but there are many ways to prevent it.

In our Science class, we went to the lab to measure the level of glucose in the blood of some 8th graders. All the results were from 70 to 80 mg/dl, it means that our volunteers are pretty

OLMatters: Há quanto tempo você trabalha na Escola?

Sou uma pessoa determinada, porém sou impulsiva, ou melhor, explosiva! Muitas pessoas olham para mim na Escola e acham que eu sou um *poço de candura*, que eu sou muito calma... elas se enganam: o pavio é curto!

Mas, eu sei os momentos certos para explodir!
