THE HISTORY AND MEANING OF EASTER

Easter or Resurrection Sunday is the day when Christians celebrate the resurrection of Jesus Christ from the dead. The early church saw his resurrection as the central witness to a new act of god in history and the victory of god in vindicating Jesus as the Messiah. This event marks the central faith confession of the early church, and was the focal point for Christian worship. Easter is an annual celebration of the Resurrection that lies at the center of a liturgical year, it has been observed at least since the fourth century.

Origin and Significance of Easter Observance

Prior to the fourth century Christians observed Pascha, a Christian Passover, in the spring of the year. It was adapted from the Jewish Passover; Pascha was a festival of redemption and commemorated both the crucifixion and resurrection of Jesus. It is likely that early Jewish Christians observed both Passover (Pesach) and Pascha. However, many Gentile converts were hesitant to adopt the Jewish festival, since the Jerusalem Council had decided that Gentile converts to Christianity did not have to observe the Jewish religious practices. By the fourth century Easter moved into a distinctively Christian celebration of the Resurrection, due to the increasing emphasis oh Holy Week.

Like Passover, Easter is a movable feast. Its date is not fixed but determined by a system based on a lunar calendar. Easter is celebrated on the first Sunday following the first full moon after the spring equinox (the day when the sun's ecliptic path in the sky crosses the equator, thus making the days and nights of equal length). This day usually occurs on March 21st, therefore Eater day can range between March 22nd and April 25th. Jewish Passover is calculated differently, so the dates for Passover and Easter do not correspond.

In the Christian church year the two major cycles of seasons, Christmas and Easter, are far more than a single day of observance. Easter itself is a period of time rather than just a day. It is actually a seven-week season of the church year, called Eastertide, which ends on Pentecost Sunday. These seven Sundays are called the Sundays of Easter.

These special days and seasons are a means to shape sacred time, a structure in which to define what it means to be a Christian and to call God's people to reverent and faithful response to God. Easter encompasses a time of preparation (Lent) as well as a following period of reflection on its significance for the life of God's people. (Pentecost).

SYMBOLS OF EASTER

The origin of the English name "Easter" is not certain, many think that it derived from the Teutonic or Anglo-Saxon goddess of spring, Eostre or Eastre.

Aspects surrounding Easter observance, such as eggs and bunnies have generated a considerable debate concerning the origin of some traditions used during Easter. Some argue that Easter is little more than an adaptation of a pagan fertility festival and has little to do with Christian tradition.

Many symbols of Easter have been adopted from various cultures. God's people have always used symbols with which they were familiar from the surrounding culture, and then infused them with new meaning to commem-orate and worship God. These symbols were radically transformed into a means of expressing faith in the only true God in spite of their "pagan" origins.

Bunny: Bunnies are known to be the most fertile animal, so they symbolize abundance. Bunnies represent new life in the spring season.

Egg: Eggs represent fertility and the emblem of life. Eggs were brightly painted to reflect the sunlight in spring.

Chick: Chicks are a symbol of life.

White lily: The white lily is a symbol of resurrection.

Sunrise: Sunrise is celebrated at Easter because Mary Magdalene entered the garden and met the Lord at the rising of the sun.

The Cross: The Cross is how Jesus Christ saved us from our sins: the price of redemption.

SYNCHRONIZED SWIMMING

Synchronized Swimming is a sport that needs a lot of physical resistance and preparation. Synchronized swimming is not only the music accompanying the beautiful movements. We athletes spend years of swimming and aerobic preparation. Not every one can do this sport. Usually we practice three to four hours a day at our club, sometimes including Saturdays and Sundays. Holidays, vacation trips, good times...these words do not exist in our dictionaries, but we love it. We practice on

all these dates on the Flamengo synchronized swimming team called "Hexa Campeão".

In December, we had a competition consisting in swimming, flexibility, choreography, weight, and figures. From all of the results of these steps, the 12 first athletes were invited to practice on the Brazilian team. (Being on the Brazilian synchronized swimming team is very important, but having the opportunity to participate in the Pan American games is something even better!) We practiced six to seven hours a day, with a break of one hour. We had been practicing since January 8th, to compete the last week of February. It was a very short period, but with a lot of work. During the month of February with the beginning of school, we practiced only four and a half hours per day. On the Brazilian team there is another type of preparation to produce movements of greater difficulty and a higher class. On February 3rd the coach had to cut two athletes, because the federation decided that each country could only take 10 athletes to the competition in Caracas, Venezuela at the end of the month. [Barbara Gomes and I made the team.]

The competition started on the day after we got there. The first part was the figure. I was 15th place overall and 6th on my team. The Colombians were very good. They practiced very hard to beat us and came close, but for the seventh time, Brazil won the South American Meet. It felt great. The tension before the competition was tremendous, but after every thing was over and we finally went up the highest place on the podium, it was a relief. Like we Brazilians say "DE VÎRADA É MAIS ĜOSTOSO!" ("A come-from-behind victory is sweetest") We were behind the Colombian team by 0,15. It is not too much, but if we had lost this competition, it would have been too much for us. This was my second time on the Brazilian team and at the **South American** *Meet.* The last one that I went I was a category below the one that I am today (Juvenil A). With each Brazilian team meet that you make, you get better technically. Athletes from all over Brazil form the team. One good thing of the Brazilian team is that you get to know other coaches, and you get to practice together with other girls of other teams. It is another way of getting to know each other. We are only rivals when we swim for our clubs and defend our colors.

Representing Brazil is really important, because what we athletes do is

not very easy, and we need to know how to do it very well, or else we can leave Brazil in a very bad position. One thing that is very hard is to study and practice at the same time. I missed a lot of classes and have a lot to catch up with.



There are perks, though, like on April 3, 2007 when I received an e-mail that the Brazilian team that had traveled to Caracas and won first place was invited to do a presentation on April 12th before the Governor of Rio de Janeiro, Sergio Cabral.

INTERNATIONAL WOMEN'S DAY

International Women's Day is celebrated on March 8 of every year, and has as its objective to inspire all women around the world to achieve their full potential. It was created on February 28, 1909 by the Socialist Party of America, in the United States, after many protests by women in the beginning of the century in favor of shorter work hours and better wages and working conditions. International Women's Day also remembers the Triangle Shirtwaist Factory fire, in New York City, in 1911 when over 140 women lost their lives. The cause of the fire was attributed to the very poor working conditions and long work hours that its women employees faced. Furthermore, Women's Day remembers the collective power of women in our society.

For this important date, we interviewed 6 women from all age ranges, asking their opinion on Women's Day and how they believed their rights have changed over the years. Their opinions were quite diverse. As we read, it is noticeable that women themselves approach the topic "women's rights" in a very different way. The bottom line is that prejudice towards women is like any other prejudice, be it towards race, color or religion, and has to be fought until everyone is indifferent.

(The interviews were conducted in Portuguese, and translated into English.)

OLMatters: "Do you believe that the existence of International Women's Day is important?"

"Yes, because women are experiencing more personal growth with each passing day." "No, because women have already overcome men in many different aspects, and are also more important than they are m in today's society, therefore a date dedicated to women is not needed."

"No, because men and women should have equal rights, if there is no international day for men, there should be no international day for women."

"Of course, because we are as important as men in society. I believe that there should also exist an international men's day. Not having this just reinforces the thought that Women's International Day was created condescending towards women."

"Certainly, because women have earned many rights in society that they didn't have in the past, such as the right to vote and to be free to do and be whatever they want."

"Very, I believe women have deserved to have a special day just for them."

OLMatters: "Do you believe that women have more rights in society today than in the past? If yes, how so?"

"Certainly, today there are women ministers of government, and even military officers."

"Yes, much more. In the past women didn't have the right to work, didn't earn a fair wage, and today they earn about the same as men."

"Oh yes. As the years have passed, women have been growing and gaining more rights. I believe the rights of women are almost equal to men's." "Yes, of course. But there is still prejudice and women are still earning less than men, even though we are as competent as men." "Of course, women have conquered their rights and have proved to be just as good as men."

"Each passing day women have greater strength in society. They continue the struggle and have almost as much power in society as men."

OLMatters: "Do you believe that women still have more rights to earn and prejudice to overcome in today's society?"

"I believe that women are already occupying many places that they once didn't, which is already a great victory. One of the few spots women haven't reached is the presidency, at least in Brazil, so I believe that this could be a next step."

"Yes, it's only a matter of putting the feeling that 'men are better' a little bit aside and we'll get there."

"I think that in the same way as men. The rights that women still have to gain are the rights that men, meaning human beings in general, still have to conquer."

"Yes, we have to unite ourselves and do whatever it takes to be treated with the same rights as men."

"I believe that yes, and naturally as time passes women will gain more rights, until we have even more rights than men."

"More rights, yes, women have to be just as men."

SYMBOL OF LIFE

Throughout the month of March, every morning as I rode in to work, I passed by a billboard produced by the City of Maricá: *Woman—Symbol of Life*. It was the city celebrating its female residents during the month of March.

Why would the present Municipal Administration be so aware of International Women's Day? But should we be so cynical as to attribute any interest in some serious issue as simply a question of political correctness?

Anthropologist, Ashley Montague, in his book, *The Natural Superiority of Women*, decades ago pointed to life as the protagonist in this claim. Even women who have never been, nor may ever be, mothers, are nurturers of life in a special, particular, unique way.

It is as important to celebrate woman as it is to celebrate life, for women themselves may forget how precious they are.

Don Quixote's quest also involved not letting the common, unlettered and crude servant girl Aldonza ever forget that she was, in fact, the beautiful, gentle, mysterious and wise Dulcineia.

Eve means mother of the living and her spirit reigns in the presence of women throughout history.
